Being your child's tech role model

- Model by putting away all media devices and catch up with each other's day. Teach your child to connect by connecting with him/her

☐ Use teachable moments (news articles, photos and videos) to point out dubious information and scam tactics



Teaching Values in the Internet Age

- Share your family values that help develop positive behaviour in your child
- Discuss bullying with your child and if they know of victims and perpetrators
- ☐ Teach your child to respect differences, how to resolve conflicts and manage his/her emotions



The Linesman

Giving children age-appropriate choices, and co-opt them into setting boundaries and rules which they can abide by

- Set clear rules and time limits on your child's media usage. When he keeps to it, praise him for his self-discipline
- Select games that involve two or more players to encourage cooperative play and make gaming a family activity
- Set parental controls and passwords to prevent purchases in games



The Visionary

Parenting for the long term. Knowing what kind of person you want your child to become and being intentional in your parenting

Teach your child values and lifeskills that will help him/her navigate both the digital and physical world.

Recommended Tech Skills:

As a family, discuss the specifics of your child's technology usage (e.g. duration, type of games allowed), rules and reasons. Consider drawing up a family tech agreement for all to sign.

Recommended Life Skills:

Gross motor skills like balancing, running, jumping; fine motor skills like handwriting, hand-eye coordination, social/emotional management, thinking skills, decision making.
